President's Message

Well, I think Spring may finally be here in the Ozarks.

Our May speaker is David Harklewood from Pea Ridge National Military Park. He will give a presentation analyzing and responding to Robert M. Sandow's argument within the context of the larger Northern war effort.

Mr. Harklewood served as an infantryman in the Penn. National Guard from 2/02-6/16 to include two tours to Iraq and one tour to Afghanistan. He holds is a Staff Sergeant and is serving as the Senior Non-Commissioned Officer in a Military History De-attachment with the Army Reserve. Mr. Harklewood has a Bachelor of Liberal Arts in History from Indiana Univ. of Pennsylvania. In May 2014 he completed a Masters of Liberal Arts in History with focus on Historical Research Studies and emphasis on early American period at Duquesne University in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Harklewood worked as a Seasonal Park Ranger at Friendship Hill National Historic Site from April 2015-September 2016. He was a Volunteer & Education Coordinator at Pea Ridge National Military Park from January 2017-Present.

Events of May, 1863

Confederates Jackman and Marchbanks were located and a hot pursuit and skirmish followed. In Lexington an order was given ordering all men who were not friendly toward the US Government out of town. Those not taking part were arrested and their businesses closed. Price reportedly will invade SE Missouri. A Confederate camp was found on Centre Creek, near Sherwood. A detachment of the 2nd Kansas Calvary was dispatched to attack and disperse them. The camp was broken up. Livingston encountered a scouting party from the 125 Militia from Newtonia. Fight began and the Militia was forced to five way. Livingston purused them about three miles. The Militia lost. The Militia was reinforced and Livingston moved on to Spring River but was not pursued. The Union burned the town of Sherwood. Major Livingston and his men were attacked near Centre Creek lead mines. There was also a skirmish ab Big Creek near Pleasant Hill. Parker was pursued to Sni where he met up with Quantrill. The pursuit ended there, supposed from lack of manpower5/21-30: A scouting party from Cassville went to Bentonville and surprised Confederate forces. Party went in pursuit of Coffee and Hunter to Pineville via Rutledge, then west of Neosho to Diamond Grove and West of Carthage about 20 miles where the fighting began. They found Coffee with about a 100 men. Hunter went north in Cedar county with about 100 men. During this time Major Livingston was not to be found. Confederate Captain Reeves on a trip near Patterson found a scouting party starting in the direction of Doniphan. They dispatched one of them, wounding others. They fell back to the Current River about 15 miles above Doniphan.

All concerts are free and open to the public except for the June 2nd. Program.

Dr. Piston reported on the books to be given away. \$80 was raised.

Stubby thanked the ladies for bringing refreshments.
